John served in Cyprus with the Royal Army Service Corps and was accompanied on the visit by fellow military vehicle enthusiast John Mitchell, who served there with the Royal Norfolk Regiment, and his wife Audrey. The dedication was lead by the Anglican Bishop of Cyprus and both Johns laid wreaths on behalf of their respective units. As both had lost friends during the conflict they also managed to arrange a visit into the 'blue zone' to pay their respects in Waynes Keep War Cemetery, Nicosia. Also a well deserved recognition has at last been acknowledged by the presentation of a Badge and certificate to one of our members Kath Aldis, recognising her contribution at Station X – Bletchley Park during WWII.



Late November saw our traditional annual Christmas gathering at the Oakland's Hotel in Norwich organised yet again by Rodney and Marina Reynolds. With a good attendance from the local membership plus friends from other areas as far afield as Yorkshire, Lincolnshire, Sussex and Kent a great evening was had by all.
